(cont) Mo. tells me that L. is eldest of 3 kids, & 2 younger  
bro. She says L. is good @ school but does not push  
herself unduly hard. L. enjoys sports but is not a high  
or over-achiever. Mo. reports no unusual or stressful  
events in the family recently. L. had acute appendicitis  
& appendectomy recently @ this hospital & no problems  
pain apart from initial presentation. She also reports that  
paroxysms of pain start very abruptly, often when L. is  
preoccupied (eg playing Nintendo, laughing & friend on phone etc.)

Clearly, this clinical picture is not typical of any one  
pain syndrome such as PSD, or neuropathic pain. However,  
the pain would seem to have a physiological basis, even if L.'s  
response may be variable. L. has apparently talked to mo.  
about learning some ways to deal w/ pain.

In light of the description of the pain as being paroxysmal,  
"stabbing" & intermittent, I would suggest considering a trial  
of an anti convulsant (eg CARBEMAZEPINE, GABAPENTIN) \*

I will also see L. on Monday to discuss training her in  
behavioural pain control methods (eg relaxation/hypnosis)
